# Practice and politics of budget allocation in Nepal

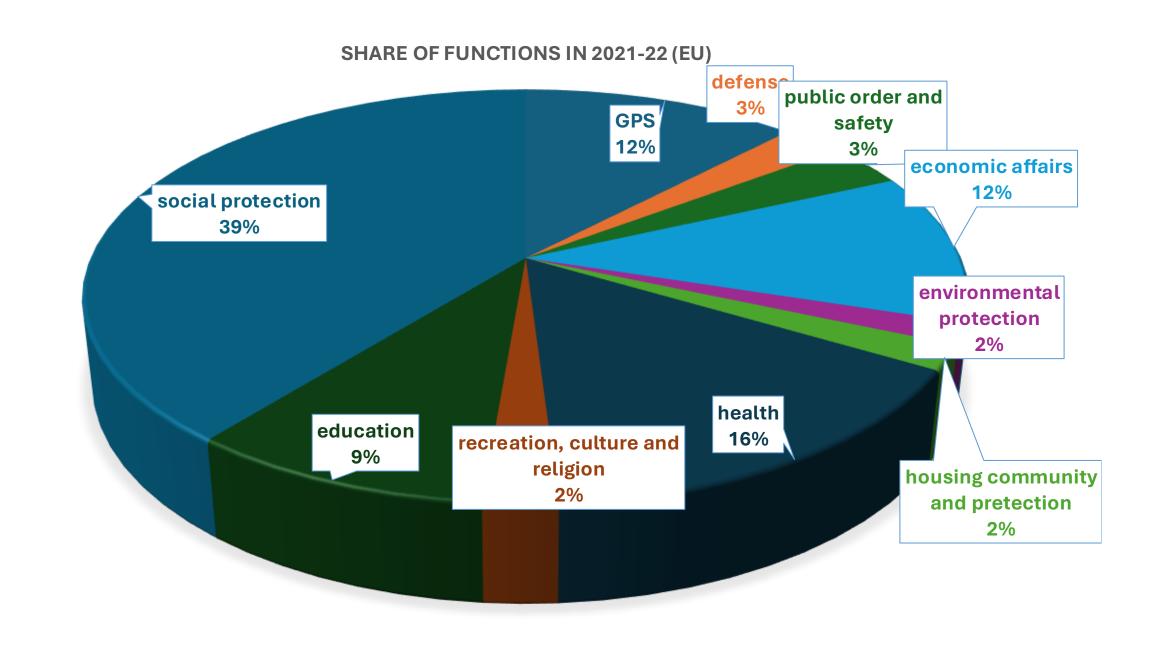
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#### **Background**

- Public sector's contribution is significant in GDP- around 19 percent Gov't spending is the redistribution of the income.
- Private Vs Public= Note Vs Vote
- · Agency/fiduciary relationship: ? on optimal mix of output-political.
- 69/70-81/82: 8 ministers announced budget 1 for 3 yrs, 3 for 2 yrs and 4 for 1 yr
- · What, How and For whom ? Opportunity cost concept

#### Introduction

- Objective: Identify the link of budget with political commitment
- Used CoFoGs
- Data: Secondary, quantitative and qualitative
- Period : 2069/70 2081/82
- Studied budget only,

## **Nepal Findings**

- Changes of shares of allocation in general public service (11 times), economic affairs (7 times), education (5 times) and health (4 times)
- Reciprocal changes of general public service with economic affairs (7 times), with education (4 times) and with health (3 times)
- Reciprocal changes of economic affairs with education and health (1 time each)

#### **Nepal Findings**

- Changes of share of allocation in economic affairs
- · Reduced: KB Mahara (up to 5%), YR Khatiwoda (up to 8.6%) and PS Mahat (up to 3.7%), BM Pun around 2%
- Increased: RS Mahat (up to 7% in economic rsch and dev but? For reconstruction activity) and BP Paudel (up to 6%)

- · BM Pun and SP Koirala (FY 2069/70) 405 bn
- Recurrent 69%, capital 16% and financial 15%
- Relatively low in economic affairs (25%) and high in GPS (31%)
  - But, significant amount of budget to agriculture ministry (3%) and Irrigation ministry 2.7%

- SP Koirala FY 2070/71 (517 bn)
- Recurrent 68%, capital 16% and financial 15%
- Focused on economic growth, preferred on economic affairs with lower ICOR areas
  - Salary increment up to 18% and Rs. 1000 addition to allowance
  - Budget allocation for capital expenditure lowest in the history (16% of total budget)
  - Increased in general economy, trade and labour to 13 bn from 9 bn of 69/70 (but, for MoFald 11.6 bn from 7.7 bn)
  - Increased in agriculture and forestry to 46 bn from 31 bn of 69/70 (increased in agriculture ministry to 21 bn from 12 bn) but irrigation constant.
  - Reduced general service to 1.4 bn from 3.8 bn of 69/70 (reduction of election budget)

RS Mahat 2071/72 – 2072/73

#### 2071/72 (618 bn)

- Rcurrent 65%, capital 19% and financial 17%
- Increased budget allocation to capital expenditure up to 30% of total budget
- Increased budget allocation to general public service functional group to 33 percent of total budget in comparison to 27 percent of previous year
  - Increase in employees retirement facilities by 5.7 percent point of total budget and 0.81 percent point in miscellaneous
  - Increase in general service by 2 percent point- increased to home ministry by 1.3 percent point of total budget
  - Decrease in public security (Home ministry- police service by 1.6 percent point)
  - Decrease in education sector by 2 percent point
- Compromised in service delivery and increased to general public service
  - Increased salary by 10%
  - Reduced economy, trade and labour by 11%, medicines and equipment by 20% and informal education by 7% than 2070/71

- RS Mahat 2071/72 2072/73
- 2072/73 (Earthquake) 819 bn
- Recurrent 59%, capital 26% and financial 15%
- 74 bn in Artha vivid under economic affairs (35 bn recurrent and 39 bn capital)
- Reduced secondary education and social security by 2 percent point each

- BP Paudel 2073/74 (Blockade) 1049 bn
- Recurrent 59%, capital 30% and financial 11%
- Highest allocation (30%) in capital expenditure budget but lowest in financial (11%)
- Employees salary increased up to 25 percent
- Social security allowance doubled, increased allocation by 3 percent point of total budget
- 84 bn (8% of total budget) in reconstruction under economic affairs group (50 bn recurrent and 34 bn capital)
- Increased allocation for physical infrastructure development by 1.6 percent point of total budget
- Reduced allocation for public debt service by 3.7 percent point of total budget
- Continued arth vivid in the name of economic research and dev. With 57 bn (9 bn recurrent and 48 bn capital)

- KB Mahara 2074/75 -1279 bn
- Recurrent 63%, capital 26% and financial 11%
- Focused heavily on fiscal transfer 332 bn(26% of total budget) and reconstruction 146 bn (11.4% of total budget)
- Massive cut in budget of service delivery (health and education) and economic development (agri, forest and fishery) – might be due to transferred to subnational level
- Significant amt in fuel and energy of economic affairs as financial provision under MoF 48 bn (3.8% of total budget)

- YR Khatiwoda 2075/76-2077/78
- · 2075/76 1315 bn
- No third level information(elaborated CoFoG based data) in schedules of budget speech
- Recurrent 64%, capital 24% and financial 12%
- Doubled expensive(mahangi) allowances to employees
- Reduced fiscal transfer by 6 percent point of total budget (presentation of the service sectors' budget in respective service sectors instead of fiscal transfer)
- Allocated for reconstruction 11.8% of total budget

- YR Khatiwoda 2075/76-2077/78
- · 2076/77 1533 bn
- Recurrent 62%, capital 27% and financial 11%
- Salary increment 18 and 20%
- Social security increased by 1k, reached 3k
- Reduced 2% point each in economic trade and labor, primary and secondary education
- Increased 2% point in transport and 3% point in auxiliary services of education

- YR Khatiwoda 2075/76-2077/78
- · 2077/78 (covid-19) 1415 bn
- Recurrent 64%, capital 24% and financial 12%
- Increased general service by 3 PP (77bn from 36 bn of 76/77)
- Decreased eco. trade and labour to 16 bn from 157 bn in 76/77
- Increased social security by 1.6 percent point, health 3 percent point and GPS by 3.5 percent point
- Reduced economic affairs by 8.6 percent point (<u>transport by 1 PP</u>, <u>economic trade and labor by 9 PP</u>) <u>i.e. cut 28% of economic affairs</u>
   <u>budget</u> (90% of economy, trade and labour) than 2076/77

- · J Sharma 2078/79-2079/80
- · 2078/79 1633 bn
- Recurrent 61%, capital 26% and financial 13%
- Indifferent in economic development
- Cut budget of one item of general public service (executive, legislative by 7 pp) and added in another item (general service by 4 pp)
- Increased on mining, mfg and construction by 11 PP of total budget (175 bn from 5 bn of 77/78) but reduced in transport by 152 bn - mis statement)

- · J Sharma 2078/79-2079/80
- · 2079/80 1794 bn
- Increase in public debt service by 3 PP (135 bn from 86 bn of 78/79)
- Reduced health sector budget by 2 PP

- · PS Mahat 2080/81 -1751 bn
- Recurrent 65%, capital 17% and financial 18%
- Increased GPS by 4PP and reduced in economic affairs by 4 PP
- Increased socoal securitie by 1 PP, public debt service by 8 PP (to 276 bn from 135 bn of 79/80)
- Reduced mining, mfg and construction by 2 PP (to 139 bn from 188 bn of 79/80)
- Cut health budget by 2 PP (13% less than 2079/80)

- BM Pun 2081/82 -1860 bn
- Recurrent 61%, capital 19% and financial 20%
- Tremendous increase in GPS by 14 PP (933 bn) fiscal transfer by 12 PP, reduced in health by 3 PP and education by 8 PP- might be due to shift of conditional grants to fiscal transfer

#### Link with periodic plan

#### • 13<sup>th</sup> plan

- One of the Priorities were improve the productivity of the agriculture sector and development of hydorpower
- But, average budget allocation for capital expenditure under agriculture ministry was only 0.51% of total budget
- Budget allocation for capital expenditure under irrigation ministry was only 2.05% of total budget, and
- <u>Budget allocation for capital expenditure under energy ministry was</u> 0.46%
- · <u>i.e weak link of budget allocation to the priorities of long term plan.</u>

#### Link with periodic plan

#### 14<sup>th</sup> plan

- The main objective of the plan was poverty alleviation through economic growth based on productive employment creation
- Which demands the sufficient budget allocation for agriculture sector as it is the largest contributors in GDP as well as employment
- But, capital budget allocation for agriculture ministry was reduced from previous plan to 0.32% of the total budget, and
- Budget allocation for Energy, water resource and irrigation ministry was 3.13% of the total budget.
- Still weak link to the objective of the periodic plan.

#### Link with periodic plan

- · 15th plan
- The goal was to provide the sustainable irrigation to the arable land.
- But, budget allocated for construction of irrigation infrastructure was only 0.76% of the total budget
- Further, even program expenditure under agriculture ministry was only 0.17% and grants was 0.96%
- Unexpected budget was allocated for monitoring and evaluation but, the distribution of grants has been questioned several times.

#### Conclusion

- Most of the finance ministers seems in the state of limbo with regards to economic development, no learning from own experiences as well as other finance ministers' activities
- None of them focused on agriculture, forestry and fishery sector, the highest contributing to GDP and employment with relatively low ICOR
- Disclosure of budget alloction in later years have been narrowed down
- Absence of robust link of budget allocation to the priority of longterm plan
- Budget allocation in the monitoring and evaluation should be scruitnized

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
